Whether we ultimately adopt the Ministry Model or return to the Boards & Committees model, we will be voting on new church bylaws. These new bylaws simplify and streamline our previous bylaws in ways that allow FCC more flexibility as we move into the future. As is typical of every Annual Meeting, we will also be voting on the proposed budget for fiscal year 2025/2026 and on the slate of officers for the coming year. We need everyone to consider their volunteerism and where they can devote time, with passion and in various increments, to ensure the success of First Congregational in the coming year. Oh, and lunch, did we mention that lunch WILL be served at the Annual Meeting? Yes, it will be a time for business and sustenance and fellowship!

Rest assured, we will return to a time to dance and party in the remainder of our 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary year. Before that, join us on June 1<sup>st</sup> and June 8<sup>th</sup> and help us to complete the next tasks that keep the church operating and walking in our Mission, guided by Christ.




**Kassi Filkins helped us** create an inspiring look for **our ONA Covenant,** which we plan to hang in the congregation for everyone to see.

This is our last book for the program year. Don't forget to bring your suggestions for next year! And thanks to everyone for another great year of reading, fellowship and lively discussions!




