Diversity in our world is a gift from God which we celebrate.

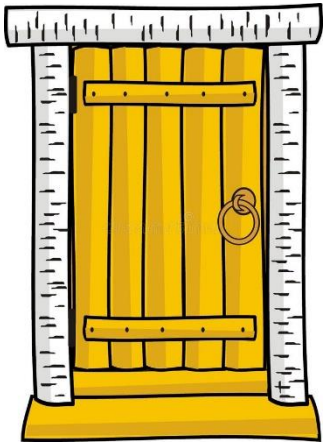

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A Message from the Minister

“...knock, and the door will be opened for you.” Matthew 7:7b.

“Listen, I am standing at the door, knocking...” Revelation 3:20a

A persistent theme in the New Testament is one of call - *hearing* God’s call, *responding* to God’s call. It is a part of many of the scripture passages I’ve been preaching from these last weeks.

Sometimes, the model is one of Jesus entering into our lives (Jesus is knocking at the door...we’ve all seen that famous image), other times, as in the passage from Matthew, above, it is us who are doing the knocking. Whichever side of

the metaphorical door we’re on, though, each meme contains elements of wonder, hope, and initiative. Wonder is the emotion that intrigues us. We’ve heard that there’s something special on the other side of that door.

Hope is emotion that is catalyzed by wonder. Can the change we long for, the happiness that we seek, the redemption that we need, be found through that door?

And initiative, is the permission you give yourself to step through the door and find out.

The initiative is your YES to God.

In my theological outlook, I believe that being “in Christ” means that we as individuals are making a focused effort to be better than our natures. That we have consciously decided that we want to live and love better than we have before, and to do that we are willing to go beyond merely hoping for the best and intentionally move towards working for the best. Sometimes that means working on our ourselves, doing the things that help us to become better people:

Yes, I will pray more earnestly.

Yes, I will declutter my life.

Yes, I will take time to read more.

Yes, I will seek to understand the views of others.

Yes, I will seek to live and love more authentically.

And other times, it is the work that we do for others.

Yes, I will volunteer for a new project.

Yes, I will spend more time with my family.

Yes, I will call that old friend from school.

Yes, I will try to forgive the wrong done to me.

Yes, I will apologize for a wrong I did myself.

Getting to “Yes” is, in a very real sense, what Jesus calls us to do.

So, my challenge to you in these last few weeks before Lent begins is to honestly ask yourself, again or for the first time, what you might be hoping for. To wonder again what God might be calling you to do and be. This Lent, let’s ponder the new ways that we might say Yes to God, both as individuals and as a congregation.

Message from the Minister of Music

We have a wonderful organ in our sanctuary, actually we have two. I found out from Greg Whitehouse that the last real overhaul of the organ was in 1967.

The organ has faithfully been tuned and minor repairs made.

Now, however, we are facing some major work to be done on the organ. Let me explain just a little of organ anatomy. The organ in the chancel has 3 manuals (that is, 3 keyboards for the hands) and a pedal board for the feet. The manuals each have 61 keys on them. The pedal board has 32.

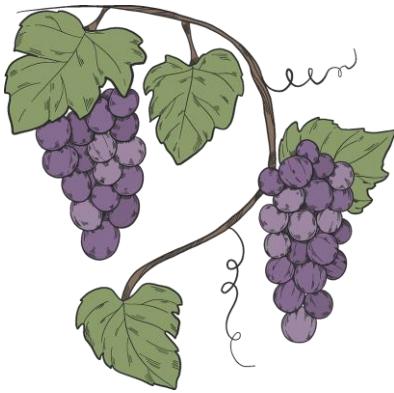
So, on the pedal board, if I play one sound like the bombarde, I have one pipe for each of those keys. Therefore, I would have 32 bombarde sounding pipes of graduating pitch. In organ jargon, that is a rank of pipes. Now the bombarde pipe is a reed pipe (like a trumpet sound) and it needs a higher pressure of air to sound. It is in a special box in the organ loft. These are the first pipes effected with conditions like dry air, heat, and age.



Here is a cartoon picture of an organ where you can identify the manuals and pedals.

On the music scene many things are happening.

1. The new beginning recorder group is meeting from 11:15-11:30 am Sundays right after church in the music room. I have extra recorders if anyone would like to join who doesn't have one.
2. OH, JONAH, a youth musical. We hope to present this on Sunday, May 17 in the Church service. Rehearsals are Sundays 11:30-12:15.
3. A Choral Sermon is scheduled for Sunday, March 22, 2026. We have started working on it on Wednesday nights. We can use some new voices! It's fun—the more the merrier and it is for a limited time period.

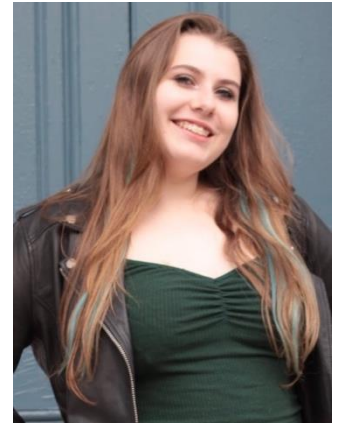
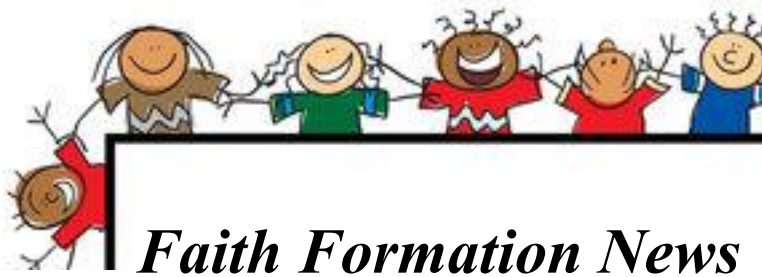

How Black History Month Got Started

The Open and Affirming Team thought it would be interesting to highlight that this February, Black History month marks the 100th year since this observance originated in this country. “Century of Black History Commemorations” is the theme chosen this year by The Association for the Study of African American Life and History founded by Carter G. Woodson. Woodson, who was the son of former slaves, was the second African American to acquire a PhD from Harvard University. He saw the importance of establishing an initiative to be celebrated annually on a national scale that promoted the history, culture, and achievements of African Americans. Therefore, he launched Negro History Week in February 1926, designed to coincide with the birthdays of two great Americans who shaped African American history, Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. Negro History Week was a coordinated effort to develop lessons and encourage the teaching of African American history across the country’s communities and public schools. Woodson believed that denying people of their history denies them of their humanity. He wrote “Those who have no record of what their forebears have accomplished lose the inspiration which comes from the teaching of biography and history.”

By 1976, then U.S. President Gerald Ford formally expanded the week-long recognition into Black History Month to “honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history.” Black History Month has been celebrated in the United States every February since and starting at the first Negro History Week in 1926, other countries, including Canada, the United Kingdom, Germany, and the Netherlands have joined the United States in celebrating black people and their contribution to history and culture.

The Open and Affirming Team would like to encourage everyone to watch a documentary or read an article or book during the month of February about a prominent person, group or event in African American history. Please remember to check out the Open and Affirming library for some reading options, and if you’re interested in local history you can consider researching Chatham Freeman and his wife Rhea who were some of the first African American slaves to be freed in Wallingford, CT.

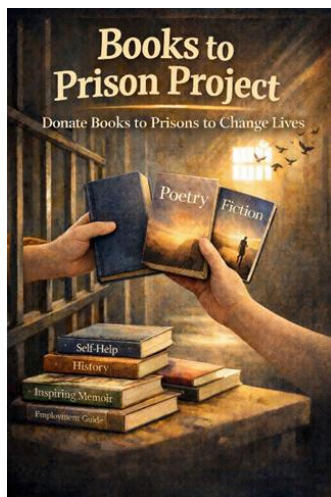

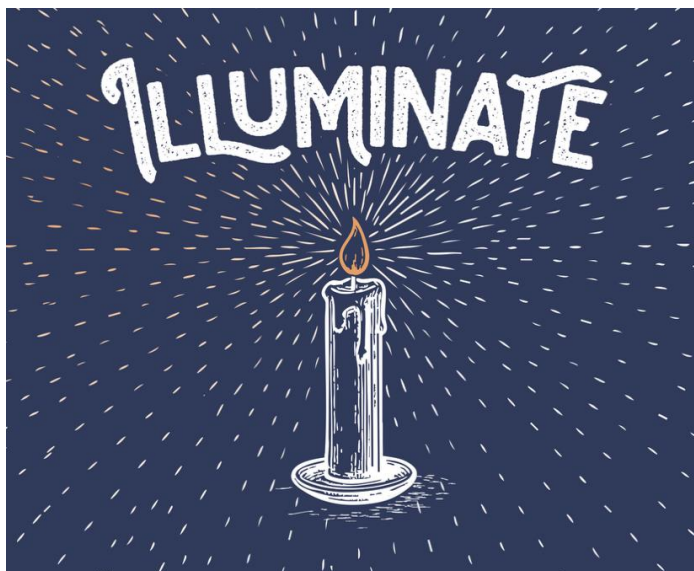

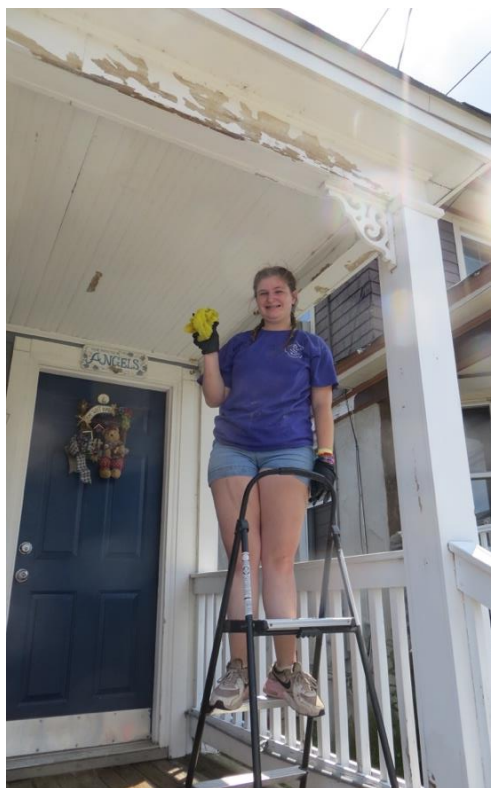

Our financial plan:
